

GEOGRAPHY: rivers around the world

First of all, you need to find the *Rivers around the world* video on Espresso (This is how to find the video on a laptop. If you are using a different device, I'm sure the instructions will be very similar.):

- 1. Go to: https://www.discoveryeducation.co.uk/
- 2. Click Login, then click on Espresso.
- 3. You will need to type the user name and password (it's on the password sheet we gave you before lockdown) and then click Login
- 4. You'll then come to a webpage that says My Services. Click on the *Discovery Education I Espresso* bar.

5. You should now be at the main Espresso page. It'll look at bit like this:



- 6. In the search box, type: Rivers
- 7. You'll now see this page. Scroll down to the fifth item on the list. It says: *Rivers of the world*. (It has a video symbol beside it.) Click on it, breathe a huge sigh of relief for getting this far, and watch it.



Task: I would like you to select any one of the rivers in the video and create a piece of writing (like this one, on the right, about the River Nile). You'll need to do your own research. Espresso may well be worth exploring for information about your river. You could also try:
