

Week 3 History: VE day

On the 7th of May 1945, Germany surrendered (gave up fighting the war) to Western and Russian military commanders. The next day, **the 8th of May**, was declared as the official day of celebration. People all over Europe were tired of years of hardship and bombing, they wanted to return to a normal life again.

In London, tens of thousands of people came into the city centre. They listened to a speech by Prime Minister Winston Churchill in Trafalgar Square which was delivered over the radio through huge loudspeakers. People across the UK put up flags, banners and streamers were everywhere. There were parties, fireworks, and some people wore **red, white and blue** rosettes. We still celebrate VE day today as sign of continued peace and we remember those across Europe who fought in WWII.
