
- 2. Watch the video you watched yesterday to remind yourself how to translate shapes and then complete the following:


Rectangle ABCD is translated so vertex C is translated to (3, 5).

## **HISTORY:** Ancient Greeks: heroes and monsters

I hope you enjoyed reading about Perseus and Medusa, yesterday. The Weird Sisters were pretty ...um...weird, too.

Today I want you to have some fun. I want you to imagine that you are an Ancient Greek story teller living in your city-state. Maybe you sit on the steps of the temple telling stories of gods, goddesses, heroes and monsters. Or maybe you locate yourself near to the agora where crowds can gather around and hear your tales of quests.

**Task:** You do not have to write the story of the quest. Quite simply, today I want you to draw two faces – one is to be your hero and one, your monster.

- 1) Divide a piece of paper (A4 if you've got it, or larger) in two draw a line down the middle.
- 2) Label one side *Hero* and the other *Monster*. Create names for your hero and monster. E.g. *Hero: Perseus Monster: Medusa*
- 3) Draw or paint the faces. Please don't do just an outline and basic features. Whether you are a confident artist or not, have a go at adding detail and colour to the two faces. Use the skills that you learnt and used when you did self-portraits a few weeks ago.

- 4) Your hero and/or monster can be male or female. Or maybe both! E.g. Tiresias (Tie-ree-see-us), another Ancient Greek story character, was turned from a man into a woman for seven years by Hera, Zeus' wife.
- 5) Find an adult and tell them about why your hero will battle the monster.
