HISTORY Ancient Greeks: theatre

The Ancient Greeks loved going to the theatre – there were no televisions, tablets, devices, radios, cinemas, etc.

Their theatres were outside.

1) Type into Google 'Ancient Greek theatres' and take a look at *Images*.

Sophocles (Sof-o-klees), Euripedes (You-rip-ee-dees) and Aeschylus (Ee-skee-lus) were the top three playwrights of the fifth century BC (500BC) and all three were Athenians (they lived in the city-state of Athens). They were especially famous for writing tragedies.

There were only three actors performing a play and then there was the chorus. Today we are concentrating on the actors. So, if there were only three actors, how did they perform plays with more than three characters?

2) You don't need to read the whole of the webpage, but take a look at the video: https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/z87tn39/articles/zgpdixs

So the actors wore masks to show they were performing as a different character and to show different emotions and to make it easier for the audience who were high up and far away from the stage to see what was going on. The masks had large holes in the mouth so that the sound of their voices could travel across the theatre.

- 3) Type into Google 'Ancient Greek theatre masks' and take a look at *Images*.
- 4) **Task**: make **two** Ancient Greek masks to portray two different emotions, e.g. anger and joy; fun and tragedy.

- b) Using curled paper, threads of wool or similar materials, stick hair or beards to your mask.
- c) Remember to cut out a large mouth, so your voice can be head.
