

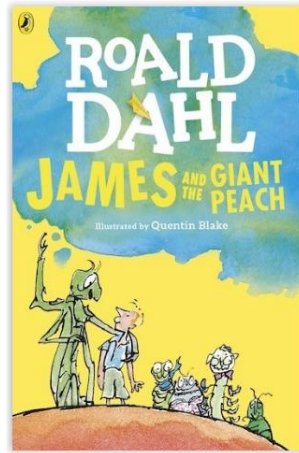

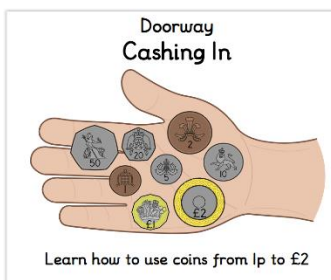

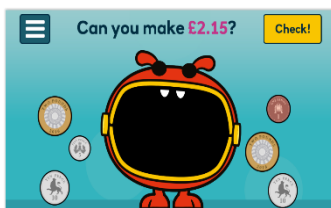

Dissect a flower and learn about their structure with this simple hands-on dissection activity and other exciting plant experiments.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DISSECT A FLOWER

Any flowers with large parts work really well, for example:

- Lily, Iris or Tulip
- Paper plates or sheets of cardboard
- Magnifying glass – optional
- Tweezers
- Scissors



HOW TO DISSECT A FLOWER

- Lay your flower out over a paper plate, tray or sheet of cardboard. Can you identify the different parts?
- Label areas of the different parts of a flower on your piece of cardboard or paper plate and place the dissected pieces with the correct label.

Can you find the following and describe their function?

- **Root**
- **Petal**
- **Leaf**
- **Pollen**
- **Stem**

If you don't have a flower to dissect, why not paint, draw or use scraps of paper to create your own flower. When your art work is complete label and describe the parts of your flower.
