Yesterday, we looked at how Roald Dahl described Aunt Sponge and Aunt Spiker. Carefully chosen adjectives helped to create the picture of the horrible aunts in our minds. Aunt Sponge with her 'small piggy eyes' and her 'sunken mouth' The actions of the characters were important too as it helped us (the reader) imagine them as they lounged in the garden watching James closely.

As part of the challenge you were asked if you could spot another technique that Roald Dahl used to describe. The answer is that he uses a <u>simile.</u> 'like a great white soggy overboiled cabbage' In the poem a simile appears too 'as lovely as a rose' Did you spot them?

Let's revise similes and metaphors today.

Similes

A simile describes something by **comparing it to something else** using the words **like** or **as.** For example:

She's as feeble as a mouse.

Metaphors

A metaphor is a word or a phrase used to describe something **as if it were something else.** For example: Jess *is* dynamite.

Jess isn't made of dynamite, but it's a good way to explain how exciting she is

How could you convert 600p into pounds? How could you convert 620p into pounds?




