

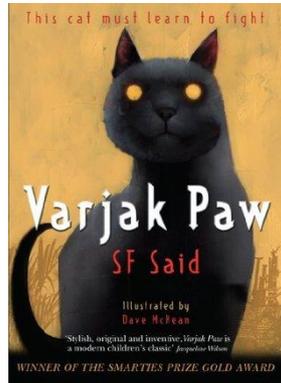

We are continuing to learn about time. Remember 'past' and 'to' the hour. Each interval between the numbers on the clock face is 5 minutes.


You can print this if you like, or write the time in words in your homework book.

Write the time in analogue – e.g. half past three, twenty to seven.



Here are some I found on my walks. Can you work out the letters? Send us what you find please!




